About the Presentation

When students display inappropriate behaviors in school, staff responses have traditionally been punitive. To effect lasting behavior change, we can use instances of inappropriate behavior as an opportunity to provide instruction in more prosocial behaviors and develop a plan for making better choices. This begins with helping students recognize the impact of their behavior on the environment, on others, and on themselves through the restorative process.

The restorative process begins with guided restorative conversations and ends with an action plan that outlines student and staff responsibilities to increase the likelihood of success in the future. Part of the process may also include assigning a meaningful task. This session will focus on the why, the how, and the impact of restorative processes when working with students with challenging behaviors.
